

#### Recognizing Saints in the Episcopal Church

As a cradle Episcopalian (one raised in the Episcopal Church), I could never understand why my Roman Catholic relatives prayed to saints instead of directly to God. My grandmother, a devout first generation Polish Catholic, prayed to different saints for intercession; her particular need dictated which saint received her prayer. This practice of asking the saints for intercession confused me. I always felt that if I had a particular petition it is more efficient to go directly to the source, cutting out the cosmic middle-man. I was later surprised to discover that the Episcopal Church also recognizes saints but with a slight difference. In the Roman Catholic Church a saint is a person formally recognized by the church as one who has received special favor from God. Being recognized as a saint is a long, formal process that ends with formal recognition by the Pope. In contrast to the Roman Catholic tradition the Episcopal Church sees any baptized Christian who has the potential to be an example of faith to others as a saint of God. In the Episcopal Church saints are not officially canonized and a wide selection of people are considered "saints" including those carried over from our Roman Catholic past, those recognized by the Church of England and newer "saints" recognized only by the ECUSA. Some of the feast days for saints can be found in the BCP, in Lesser Feasts and Fasts, 2006 and in Holy Men and Holy Women. I thought it would be fun to look at some of the saints recognized by the ECUSA.

## The Dragon Slaying Saint

All but six days in April are set aside for the recognition of at least one saint including; April 4 for Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., April 9 for Dietrich Bonhoeffer and April 25 for Saint Mark the Evangelist. I have always had a fascination with St. George, recognized on April 23<sup>rd</sup>. There are no known details of his life and it is quite possible (even likely) he never existed. It is popularly assumed he was a soldier in Palestine who was martyred for the faith.

George first becomes popular with soldiers during the First Crusade. It appears there was a vision of George (sources differ on this point, some say it was a mass vision and others claim it was a personal vision shared with the troops) before a successful battle. The legend grew, and when Richard the Lion-Hearted went to fight in the Holy Land he placed his armies under the protection of St. George. Crusaders are often depicted carrying the symbol of St. George, a white flag with a red cross on it. It did not take long for George to become the patron saint not only of soldiers and farmers but also of England.

In 1483 a book called the *Golden Legend* was translated into English. The text depicts George's defeat of a dragon that was terrorizing the populace. He leads the dragon back to the king and promises to

kill the dragon if the citizens would only believe in Christ and be baptized.

St. George is held up as an example of Christian chivalry. The feast day of St. George is recognized in many countries as a lesser feast but in England he is still revered. Real or imagined St. George stands as an example of Christian fidelity.

Almighty God, you commissioned your holy martyr George to bear before the rulers of this world the banner of the cross: Strengthen us in our battles against the great serpent of sin and evil, that we too may attain the crown of eternal life; through Jesus Christ our Redeemer, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

### Presiding Bishop Katharine Jefferts Schori Lent Message 2014



The reality is that the season of Lent, which Christians have practiced for so many centuries, is about the same kind of yearning for greater light in the world, whether you live in the Northern Hemisphere or the Southern Hemisphere.

The word "Lent" means "lengthen" and it's about the days getting longer. The early Church began to practice a season of preparation for those who would be baptized at Easter, and before too long other members of the Christian community joined those candidates for baptism as an act of solidarity.

It was a season during which Christians and future Christians learned about the disciplines of the faith - prayer and study and fasting and giving alms, sharing what they have.

But the reality is that, particularly in the Northern Hemisphere, the lengthening days were often times of famine and hunger, when people had used up their

The reading will be held on Wednesday, May 28, 2014, at 7 p.m. at St. John's Church, Ashfield, along with the announcement of the youth poetry contest winners.

As a part of this series, young people ages 13 to 18 are invited to enter a youth poetry contest. The

Marilyn Nelson is one of America's most celebrated poets. She is a three-time finalist for the National Book Award, winner of the Newbery and Coretta Scott King awards, among others. She is the author or translator of fifteen poetry books for adults and children, five chapbooks, and in 2013 she published a memoir entitled, led *How I Discovered Poetry*—a series of 50 poems about growing up in the 1950's in a military family. Two of her widely honored books are *Carver: A Life in Poems* and *A Wreath for Emmett Till*.

Image Journal writes, "American history as conceived by Marilyn Nelson is the inside-out, last-shall-be-first version. She inhabits the voices of the overlooked and disenfranchised and shines light into forgotten corners that reveal essential truths about the whole....But if she is a revisionist historian's poet, she is also a child's poet, a mother's poet, a housekeeper's poet, and scientist's poet....It's this breadth of perspective, from pole to pole, past to

present, from spheres domestic to atmospheric, that make her so remarkable. Nelson is also an openhanded citizen of the nation of writers."

Ms. Nelson also received a fellowship from the J.S. Guggenheim Memorial Foundation, and the Frost Medal—the Poetry Society of America's most prestigious award, for a "distinguished lifetime achievement in poetry." Nelson is a professor emerita of English at the University of Connecticut; was (2004-2010) founder/director and host of Soul Mountain Retreat, a small non-profit writers' colony; and held the office of Poet Laureate of the State of Connecticut

Sarah Browning, Ann's daughter and director of the Split This Rock Poetry Project in Washington, D.C., a poet in her own right, will also speak at the reading.

The genesis of the Ann Browning Poetry Series came from former Ashfield resident, Mark Zenick, now of Shropshire, England, who was so moved by Ann Browning's book of poetry, *Deep Landscape Turning*, published before her death, that he wanted to provide an enduring tribute for her in the form of this annual reading. The event is free and open to the public. Books will be available for signing, courtesy of Boswell's Books in Shelburne Falls. Refreshments will be served.


