#### Brother Martin of Erfurt

Brother Martin of Erfurt, or as we know him, Martin Luther, was born November 10, 1483 in Eisleben, Saxony in the Holy Roman Empire, what we know as Eastern Germany. His was not a family of means, in fact they were peasants. He joined the Order of St. Augustine and earned a Doctor of Theology degree.

In 1517 he posted his infamous 95 Thesis on the chapel door of the University of Wittenberg. These were meant to create discussion in the church and university addressing issues that he felt were a problem in the Roman Catholic Church. Some of these included:

- \* sale of indulgences
- \* sale of church offices
- \* inadequate education in Christian doctrine, there were no seminaries to educate priests
- \* frequent abuses of power within the church
- \* political factions within the church that caused conflicts and resentment



Martin also believed that salvation was freely given it was unnecessary for people to feel they had to in some way earn or deserve salvation. There is no need to earn salvation when God has already given it to all people.

In October of 1518 Luther was told by the Papal Legate Thomas Cardinal Čajetan to recant his positions. Luther replied that he was unable to recant unless his mistakes were pointed out through the use of scripture. He also stated that because of biblical prophecy the papacy was the Antichrist and not part of the biblical church. Unsurprisingly in June 1520 the pope issued a bull threatening to excommunicate Luther. Luther received the bull in October and publicly burned it on December 10<sup>th</sup>.

In January 1521 Luther was excommunicated, in March he was summoned to the Diet of Worms and when he still refused to recant his positions Emperor Charles V placed him under an Imperial Ban. It wasn't until 1524 that he officially left the monastery. Martin Luther's criticisms of the church practices in his day were possibly the largest factor in the reforms made by the Council of Trent, where the sale of indulgences, financial abuses, and education of the clergy were all addressed.

In 1526 Luther published a <u>German Mass</u> and found himself organizing a new church which we know today as the Lutheran Church. He organized a new supervisory system for the church, developed a new form of worship service and, against the practices of that day, he wrote a simple catechism for the education of lay people; these are still in use today. He made the mass more of a celebration were everyone received the bread and the wine and the individual congregations were allowed the freedom to decide on the use of things such as vestments and candles. He translated scripture from Latin into the common tongue and composed many hymns; including *A Mighty Fortress is our God* (hymn 687 & 688 in <u>Hymnal 1982</u>).

While Luther had many revolutionary ideas and helped start a worldwide discussion on the practices of the Roman Catholic Church, he still stood by other more conservative teachings of the church. After reading a

Latin translation of the Qur'an he wrote pamphlets stating his belief that Islam was a scourge sent by God to punish the Christians, destroy the antichrist (according to Luther the pope) and the Roman Catholic Church. He also believed that the Jews were blasphemers because they did not believe in the divinity of Christ; though he did preach kindness toward them and wanted to convert them to Christianity. As his attempts at conversion failed he grew increasingly bitter towards them and wrote several angry tracts against them. By 1533 some Lutheran pastors were preaching against Judaism, and suggested expelling the Jews from Germany.

Originally, Martin Luther posted The 95 Thesis to start a discussion to reform certain practices within the Roman Catholic Church. Instead, he founded a new denomination of Christianity and helped guide the foundation of many others, including the Anglican Church. Today Episcopal Church in the United States honors Martin Luther on February 18<sup>th</sup>, the anniversary of his death in 1546.

O God, our refuge and our strength: You raised up your servant Martin Luther to reform and renew your Church in the light of your word. Defend and purify the Church in our own day and grant that, through faith, we may boldly proclaim the riches of your grace, which you have made known in Jesus Christ our Savior, who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, now and forever.

#### Luther and the Ninety-Five Theses

To most historians, the publication of Luther's Ninety-Five Theses marks the beginning of the Reformation. To Luther, they were simply a response to

what he considered the blatant abuse of Johann Tetzel's selling of indulgences. Although written in Latin, the theses were soon translated into German and disseminated widely across Germany.

#### Martin Luther, Selections from the Ninety-Five Theses

- The Pope has neither the will nor the power to remit any penalties beyond those he has imposed either at his own discretion or by canon law.
- Hence those preachers of Indulgences are wrong when they say that a man is absolved and saved from every penalty by the Pope's Indulgences.
- It is mere human talk to preach that the soul flies out [of purgatory] immediately the money clinks in the collection-box.
- It is certainly possible that when the money clinks in the collection-box greed and avarice can increase; but the intercession of the Church depends on the will of God alone.
- Christians should be taught that, if the Pope knew the exactions of the preachers of Indulgences, he would rather have the basilica of St. Peter reduced

- to ashes than built with the skin, flesh and bones of his sheep.
- This wanton preaching of pardons makes it difficult even for learned men to redeem respect due to the Pope from the slanders or at least the shrewd questionings of the laity.
- 82. For example: "Why does not the Pope empty purgatory for the sake of most holy love and the supreme need of souls? This would be the most righteous of reasons, if he can redeem innumerable souls for sordid money with which to build a basilica, the most trivial of reasons."
- 86. Again: "Since the Pope's wealth is larger than that of the crassest Crassi of our time, why does he not build this one basilica of St. Peter with his own money, rather than with that of the faithful poor?"
- 90. To suppress these most conscientious questionings of the laity by authority only, instead of refuting them by reason, is to expose the Church and the Pope to the ridicule of their enemies, and to make Christian people unhappy.
- Christians should be exhorted to seek earnestly to follow Christ, their Head, through penalties, deaths, and hells.
- And let them thus be more confident of entering heaven through many tribulations rather than through a false assurance of peace.
